

18 Seized in Chicago

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CHICAGO, Oct. 19—Helmeted policemen clashed with about 100 chanting antiwar demonstrators today at Chicago's induction center.

Eighteen youthful demonstrators, seven of them girls, were arrested on charges of interfering with policemen, resisting arrest and disorderly conduct.

Some went limp and had to be carried to police wagons. Some grabbed door handles of the wagons and had to be forced in. Many shoved back when the police, armed with nightsticks, blocked two attempts to charge the door of the induction center.

About two dozen of the demonstrators marched more than a mile to police headquarters in the center of downtown Chicago after the 18 arrested had been taken there. They carried signs with pictures of the Presi-

dent labeled "Bloodfinger Johnson."

At the station about 15 persons went to an 11th-floor courtroom where they expected bond to be set for those arrested. They were ordered and escorted out. The arrested demonstrators, meanwhile, sang freedom songs in the police headquarters. Some had to be carried to the lockup for booking.

The demonstrators, mostly University of Chicago students, charged police brutality.

The demonstration, sponsored by Chicago Area Draft Resisters (Cadre) and the University of Chicago chapter of Students for a Democratic Society, had been announced in advance as one of the protests being conducted throughout the country this week preliminary to a national demonstration in Washington this weekend.

Consequently, about 100 policemen were on hand when the youths arrived before 6 A.M. at the induction center. Their signs and chants of "Hell No, Don't Go" and "It's Johnson's War" attracted a crowd of onlookers.

The police warned them not to obstruct sidewalk traffic or the doorway of the center. Soldiers and policemen barred them from entering the building.
